



















Social Determinants of Health and HIV Among Asians, Native Hawaiians, and Pacific Islanders

In 2020, **Asian, Native Hawaiian, and Pacific Islander** people represented **2.3%** of all new HIV diagnoses in the U.S. Social determinants of health such as **poverty, lack of health insurance, education, and unemployment** can negatively impact **HIV-related health outcomes** for **Asian, Native Hawaiian, and Pacific Islander** people.
